Boomers - What Next?

How are our churches preparing for this important ministry opportunity?

1 Growing ministry to over 55s in your church

2 Hearing and engaging those with dementia

Dementia is the single greatest cause of disability in older Australians. This workshop helps Christian leaders and carers explore pastoral and spiritual care of those with dementia. It will give some understanding of dementia and discuss ways to improve the experience of people with dementia in a church context.

3 'The Arts of Care': finding each person, from fourth age to death

Our aged care systems exhibit increasing professionalism in safe, efficient and dignified care of people, from a person's entry into the system through to his or her death. Even so, each person's 'personhood' can be subtly lost in the hidden but serious ways which inadvertently dehumanise. This workshop considers personhood from the perspective of those 'arts of care' that enable us to find a person, no matter what stage of life they are at.
